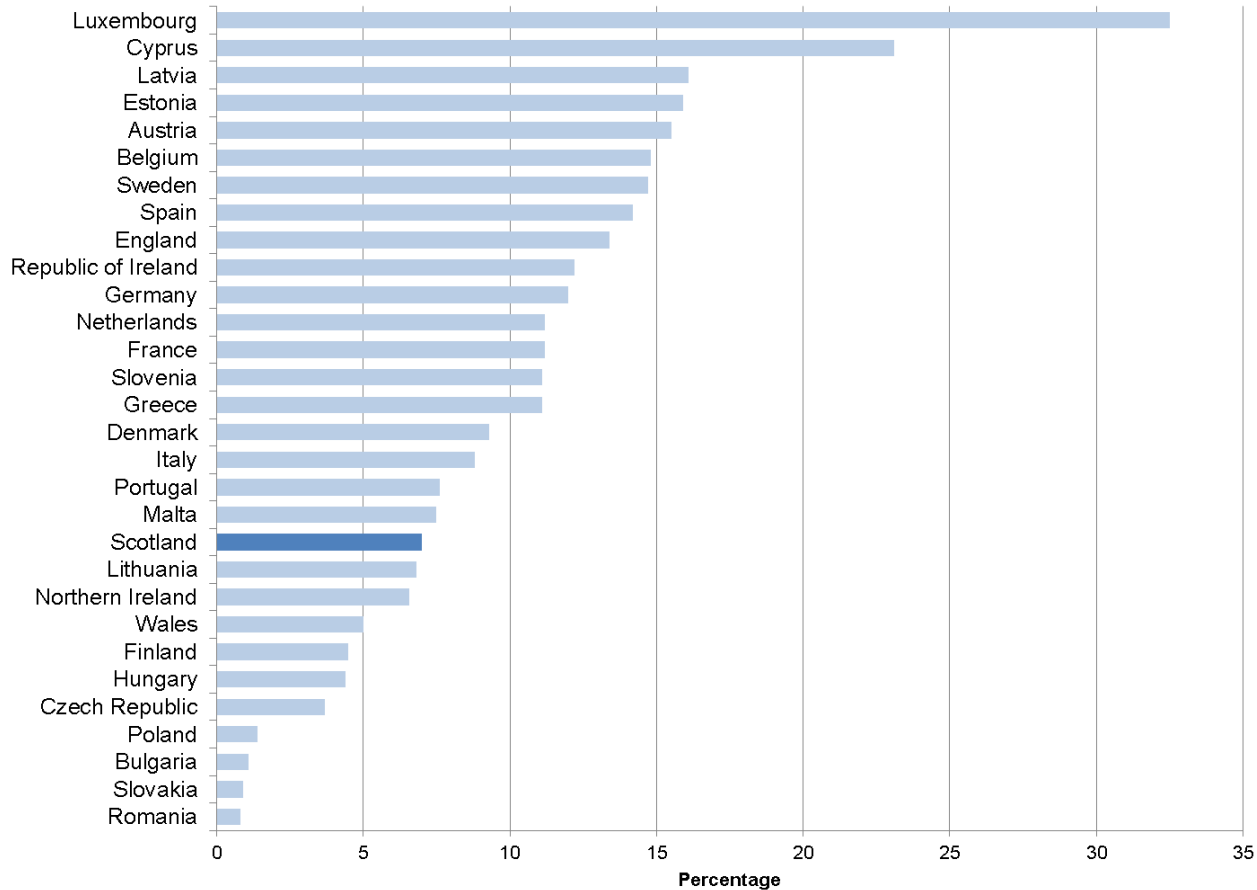

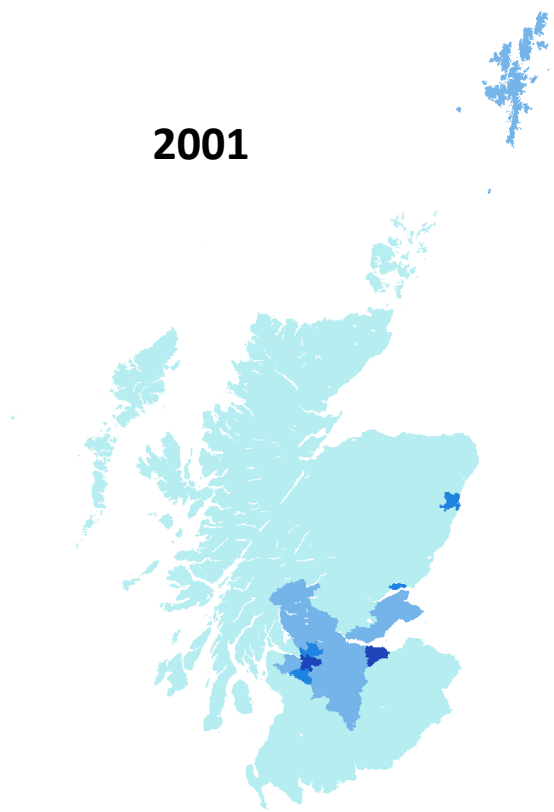

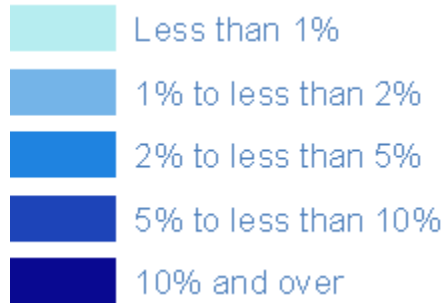
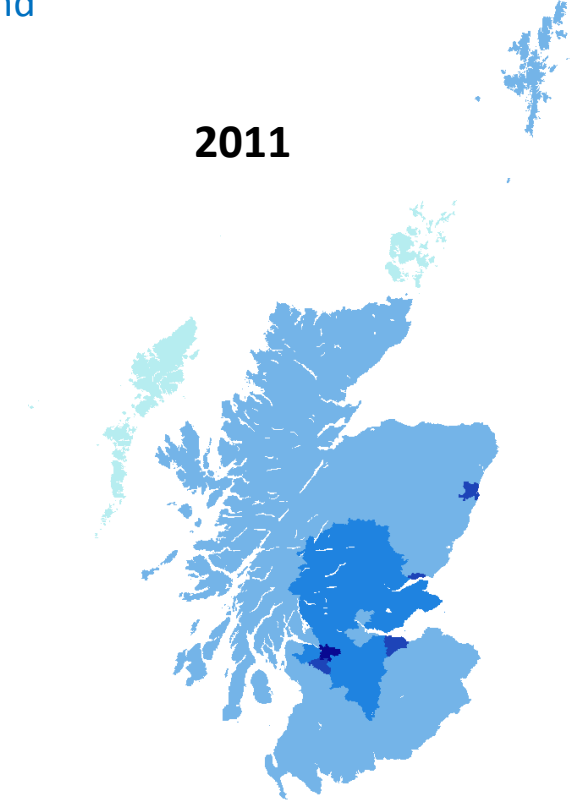
# Growing ethnic diversity

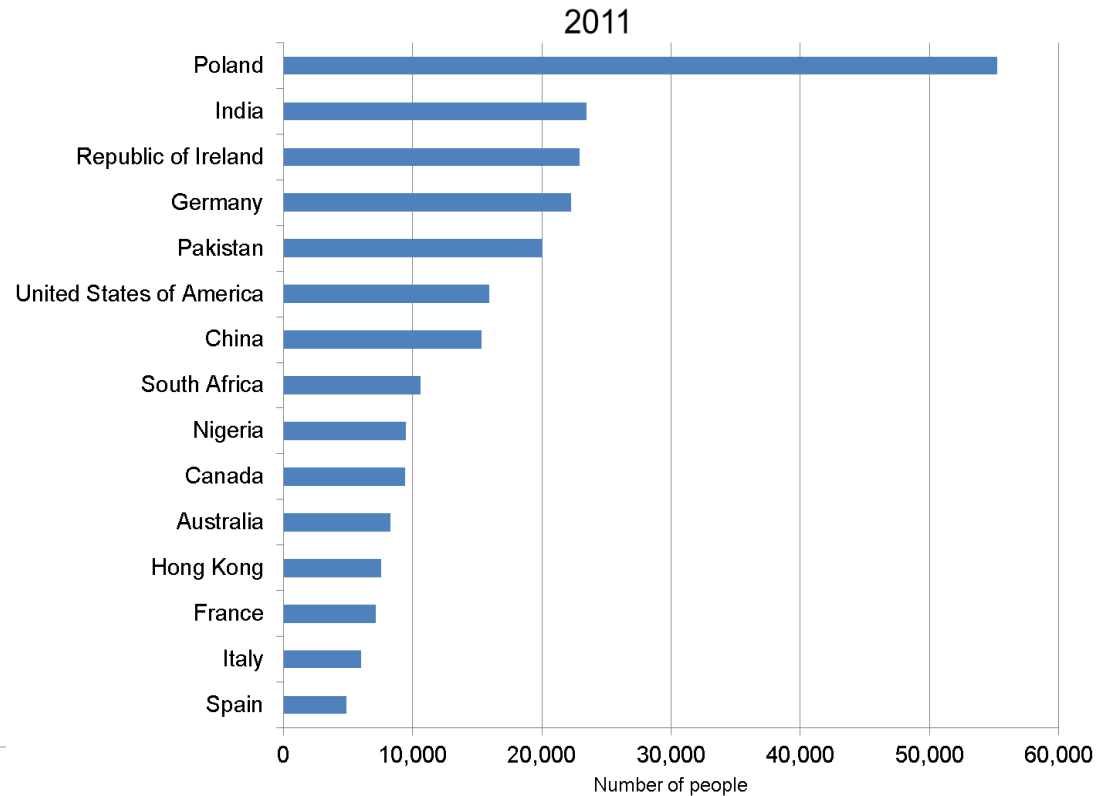
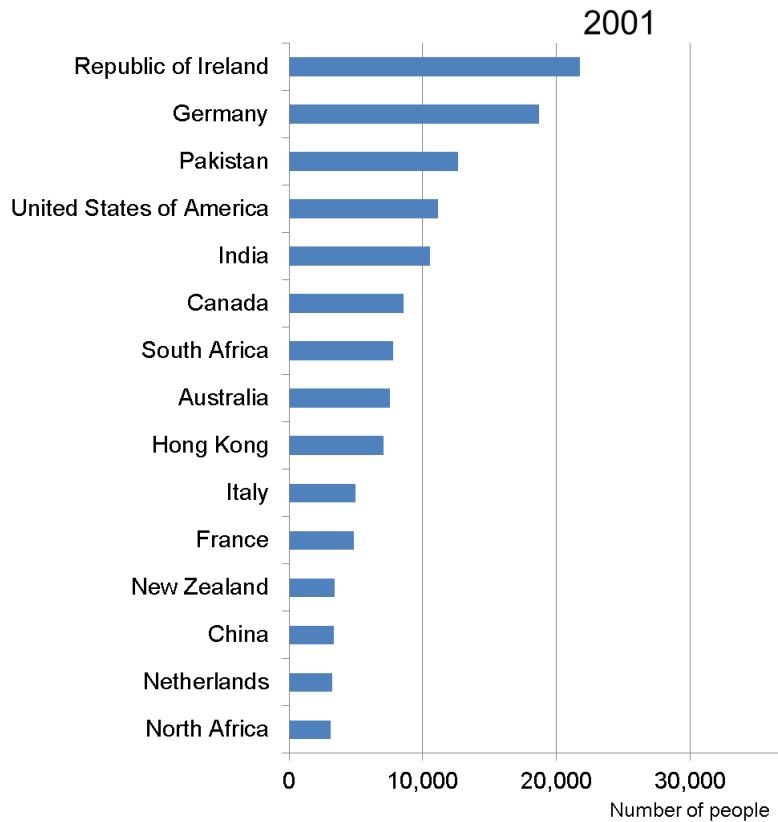

Glasgow City had the largest number of non-UK born people in 2012 (estimated at 86,000)



# English language proficiency

1.4 per cent of people (73,000) aged 3 and over in Scotland were reported as being unable to speak English well or at all.

English only	4,741,000	92.6
Scots	56,000	1.1
Polish	54,000	1.1
Gaelic	25,000	0.5
British Sign Language	13,000	0.2
Other	230,000	4.5
